**Background/Discussion:**

The District's accounting department staff prepares the monthly financial reports. The District's annual budget, which is adopted by the Board each June for the following fiscal year (July 1 – June 30), is formatted to mirror the monthly financial statements. The financial reports provide the Board with a monthly recap of expenditures and revenues, along with year-to-date account balance information.

In compliance with A.R.S. §48-807(O), the following reports have been added to the monthly financial statements packet:

1. Cash Flow – All Governmental Funds.

The Cash Flow report consists of the combined cash balances of all District Funds. These balances include the General (100), Transport Services (150), Capital Projects (200), Bond Proceeds (300), Special Revenue (400), Debt Principal (500), and Debt Interest (600) Funds. The Cash Flow report is updated monthly with the actual revenues deposited into and actual expenditures disbursed from the District's cash accounts. It is important to note the revenues and expenditures are reported on a Cash Basis. This report is generated to demonstrate that the fire District maintains sufficient cash available to satisfy the projected expenditures budgeted over the course of the fiscal year.

2. Fund Account Bank Reconciliations.

The reconciliation of each of the District's Fund Cash Accounts (General (100), Transport Services (150), Capital Projects (200), Bond Proceeds (300), Special Revenue (400), Debt Principal (500), and Debt Interest (600) Funds) between the Pinal County Treasurer's monthly bank statement and the District's Fund balance sheet report is provided. To signify Board approval of the monthly financial statements and bank reconciliations, the Board Chairman is requested to sign the attached Letter of Acceptance which will be kept on file at the District.

- SFMD (V-fib/V-tach) survival rate is higher than the statewide average (SFMD is 40% for the 2016 Calendar Year)
- In SFMD's first year of Ambulance Transports 4,262 patients were transported to local hospitals and SFMD exceeds response time compliance rates set forth by the AZ Department of Health Services
- 1,324 people were trained in hands only CPR
- SFMD received a Community Risk Grant for \$110,735 from FEMA (Fire Prevention and Safety)

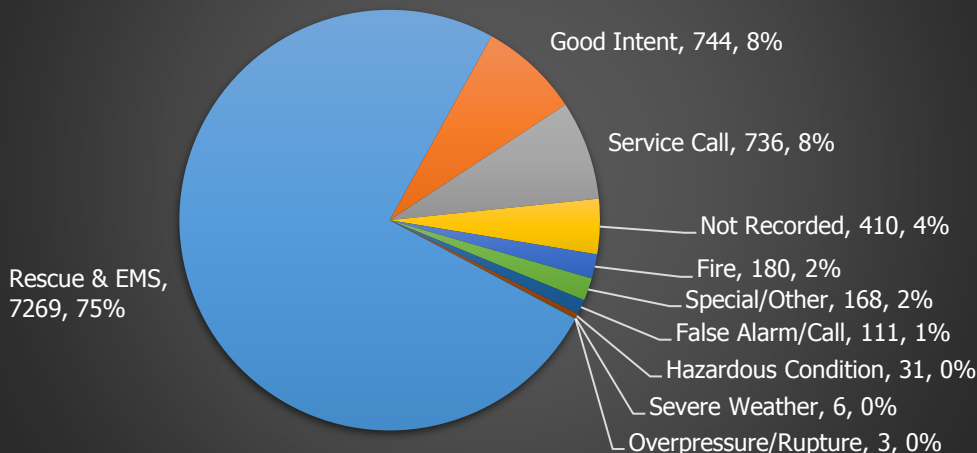
## Our Commitment

Total Incidents

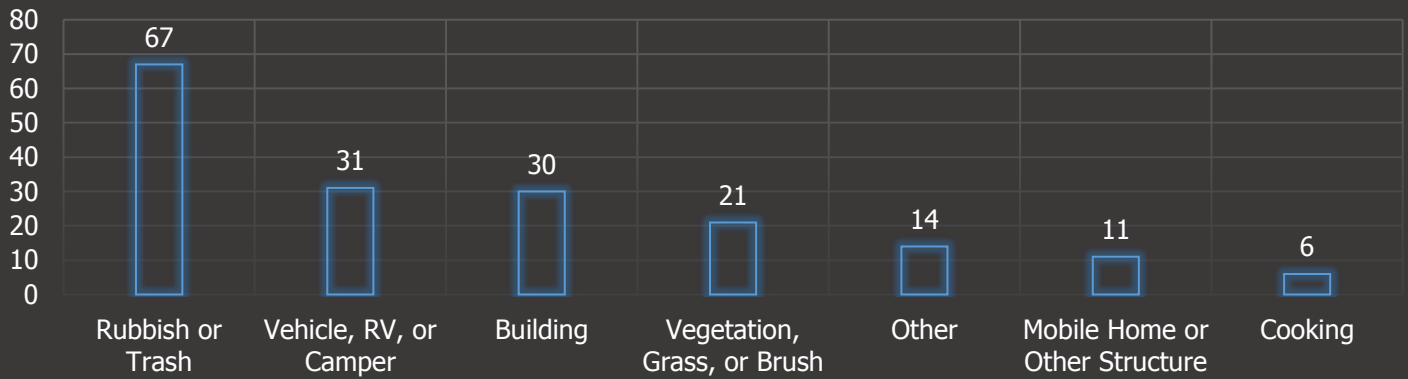

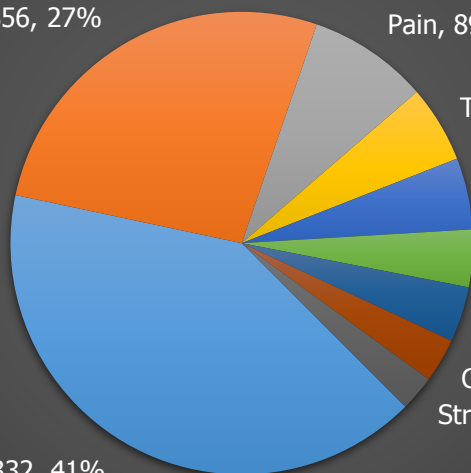

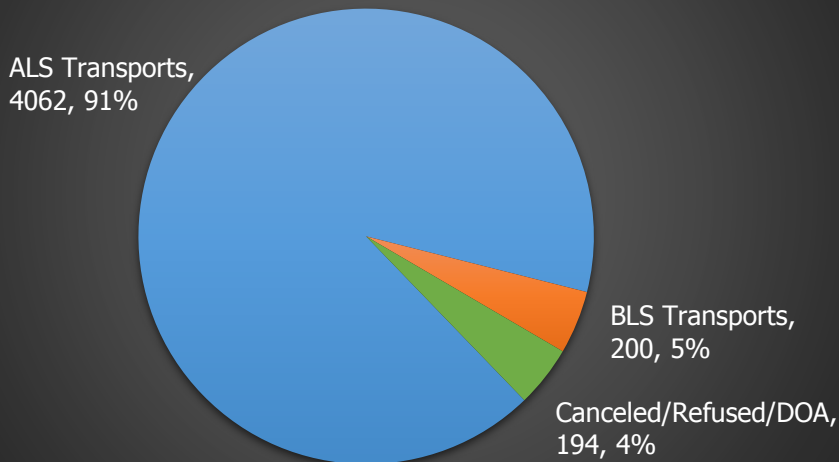


# TRANSPORT SERVICES

## Increased Service Levels in the Community

In 2016/17, the district completed its first full year of emergency transport service operations. In addition to providing Advanced Life Support (ALS) transport services, SFMD began providing Basic Life Support (BLS) transport services as well. This has led to a significant increase in service requests for emergency transport services. To meet this demand another 24-hour ambulance has been added to better serve our community. Increased customer satisfaction, patient care, and response times have all contributed to the success of this program.

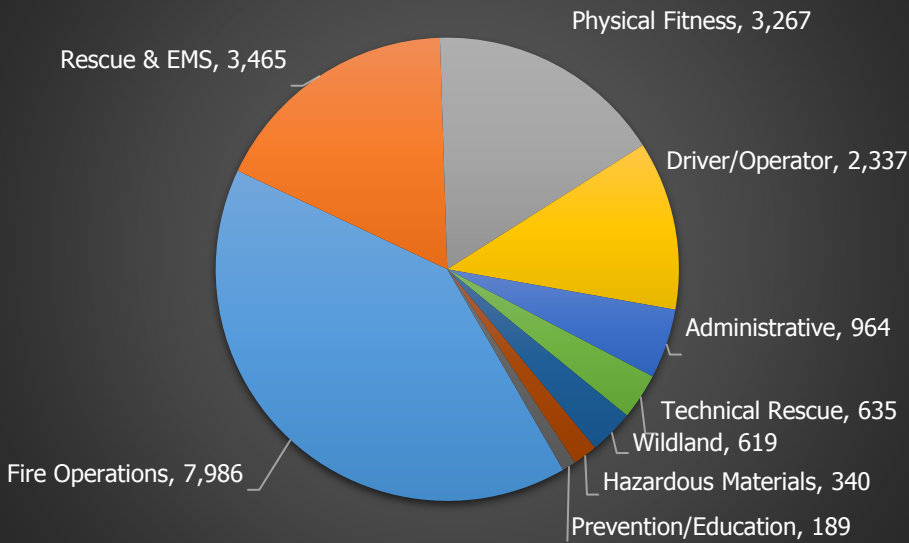

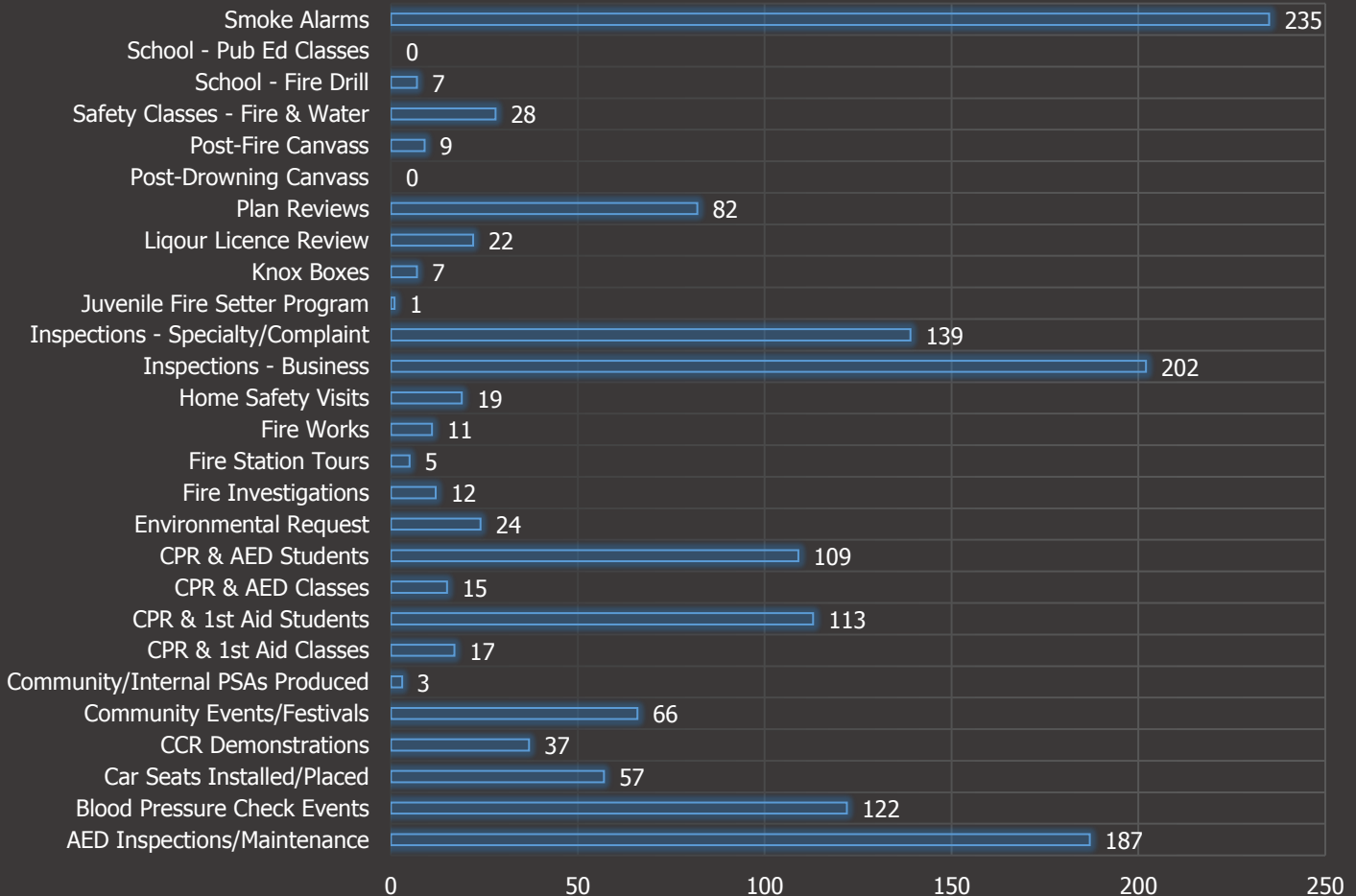

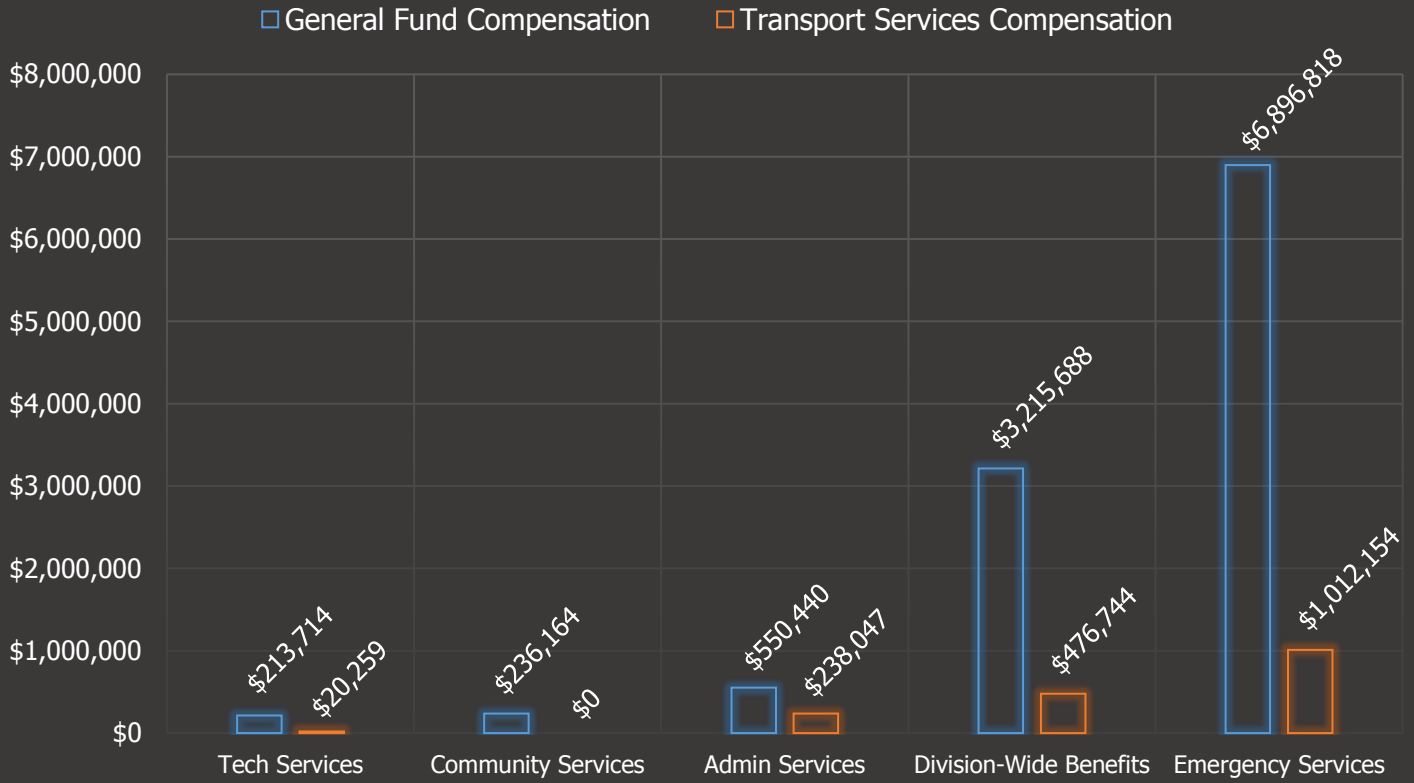

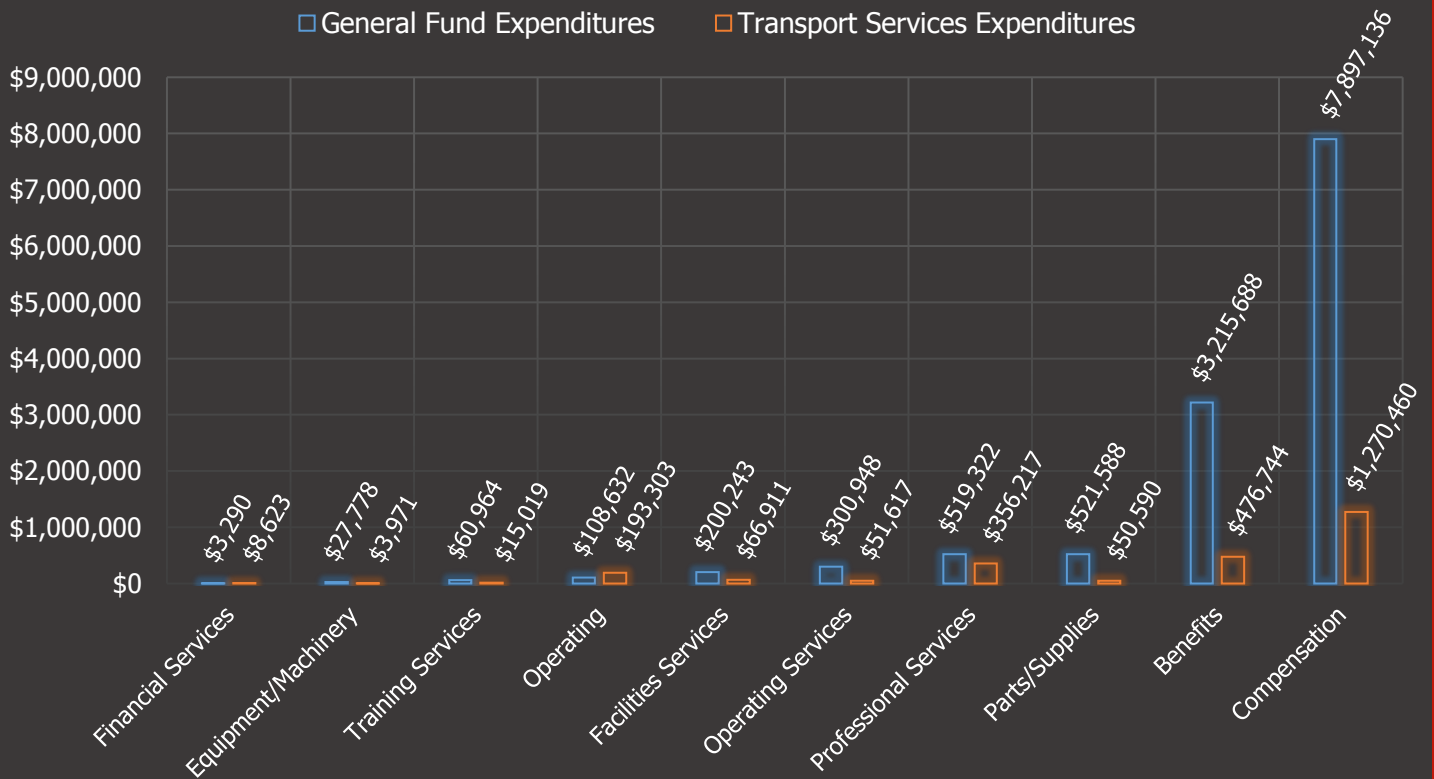

## The Importance of Grant Funding

Government grant funding for firefighting programs helps provide financial support to agencies that may otherwise fall short on revenue. Over the last several years, these grants have provided SFMD with training, video conferencing equipment, smoke alarms for the community, and more. Through the next fiscal year, we will actively be seeking grant funding. SFMD will submit grants for the hiring of firefighters, necessary equipment, and essential training during the FEMA Fire Grant process. Additionally, other grants such as the Gila River Indian Community (GRIC) grant, the Firehouse Subs grant, and others will be actively pursued. It is our goal to reduce our dependence on tax-payer revenue through these grants.

# ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During Fiscal Year 2016/17, the district focused on completing many strategic initiatives. Below is a list of some of the highlights completed during that time.

- Adopted the 2015 International Uniform Fire Code.
- Successfully facilitated a temporary Tax Override.
- Opportunely negotiated Basic Life Support (BLS) transport services to SFMD from an outside provider.
- Deployed and additional full-time ambulance to increase reliability across the district.
- Accepted \$23,000 in grant funding for smoke alarms from the Gila River Indian Community.
- Trained 7 members as Administrators for the ImageTrend Records Management System.
- Configured and transitioned to the Elite Fire Module and deployed the Transfer button in the Elite EMS Module.
- Selected 3 EMT- Basics to attend Paramedic school that began in January 2017.
- Selected 3 members to attend Technical Rescue Technician (TRT) Training.
- Implemented the utilization of East Valley Wellness for enhanced firefighter medical exams.
- Promoted 1 Battalion Chief, 2 Captains, and 1 Engineer to replace vacant positions caused by attrition.
- Procured and deployed a 2016 Pierce Quantum Fire Engine.
- Deployed Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) and Bi-Level Positive Airway Pressure (BiPAP) to all front line providers.
- Attended the National Fire Academy Trainings for Executive Fire Officer, Community Risk Reduction, and Cultural Competence in Community Risk Reduction.
- Collaborated with the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) using SFMD incident data in development of predictive analysis applications.

**Background/Discussion:**

Effective July 1, 2014, the District amended its Sick Leave Caps and Payouts policy to reflect current parameters as follows:

**Sick Leave Caps and Payouts**

- D. As of the employee's official retirement date, for employees whose accrued total sick leave is below the cap (1,460 hours for 56-hour and 1,040 hours for 40-hour employees), the employee will be paid at 50% of the individual's accrued total sick leave hours, with the employee's hourly rate being calculated as the average hourly rate for the five years preceding the employee's approved (official) retirement date.*
- E. As of the employee's official retirement date, for employees whose accrued total sick leave is equal to or above the cap (1,460 hours for 56-hour and 1,040 hours for 40-hour employees), the employee will be paid at 60% of the individual's accrued total sick leave hours, with the employee's hourly rate being calculated as the average hourly rate for the five years preceding the employee's approved (official) retirement date.*
- F. Retirement is defined as retiring from PSPRS or ASRS.*
- G. No accrued sick leave will be paid upon resignation or termination.*

Prior to July 1, 2014, the District policy was to pay out accrued sick leave at 100% of the total sick leave hours upon retirement, with the hourly rate calculated at the employee's current hourly rate upon retirement.

Based on the following mitigating information, Staff is recommending amending Items D and E as explained below:

1. The belief the "value" of accrued sick leave has decreased significantly due to the change.
2. The effective cost savings of paying out accrued sick leave hours through an annual or retirement Earned Leave Buy Out (ELBO) versus having an employee use their sick leave through normal payroll, the potential cost of corresponding backfill overtime, and associated PSPRS costs.

If you take into consideration the fact that the District does not pay pension or worker’s compensation cost on ELBO payments, the potential “savings” of an employee working instead of calling in sick is significant.

**Scenario 1.** Employee calls in sick but there is sufficient leave pool resources so no overtime is needed to backfill. The comparison is to the “sick” hours not taken eventually being paid out through an ELBO payment.

The savings related to increasing the perceived value of accrued sick leave payouts is significant if all related cost elements are considered. In addition, while it is not possible to quantify, any increase in morale from the increased “value” of the sick leave benefit and/or reducing the need for compromised staffing to prevent overtime, would only be additional benefits.

Staff is recommending amending Items D and E of the District’s Sick Leave Caps and Payout policy as follows:

- D. As of the employee’s official retirement date, the employee will be paid at 100% of the individual’s accrued total sick leave hours, with the employee’s hourly rate being calculated at the employee’s current hourly rate upon retirement.
- E. Eliminated.

All other sections of the Sick Leave Administration policy would remain in effect as stated in the District’s Volume 1 Administrative Policy manual.

**Financial Impact:**

The impact of lessening sick leave usage is difficult to quantify, both from less overtime expense and improvement of morale. Staff intends to attempt to quantify the “savings” over time and report, if possible, when the information becomes available.

### Purpose

The Superstition Fire & Medical District (SFMD) recognizes it is poor practice to attempt to prohibit employees from partaking in legal activities while off-duty; however we encourage all personnel to adopt a healthy lifestyle which may include abstaining from tobacco products. This policy outlines requirements to prohibit smoking in SFMD buildings, property and vehicles.

### Policy

- A. Smoking is prohibited in all SFMD facilities, fire stations, district properties, and district vehicles.
- B. All workplace areas shall be smoke-free. Smoke-free is defined as: “no tobacco or other plant smoke and freedom from inhaling environmental tobacco smoke (ETS) or passive smoke, including secondhand smoke generated by an active smoker or side stream smoke or fumes from any such burning material, device or ashtray that continues to emit such tobacco smoke or fumes from lighted or extinguished smoking materials.”
- C. Smoking is prohibited in all conference rooms, meeting rooms, classrooms, lunchrooms, employee lounges, restrooms, and waiting areas, including hallways, and stairways.
- D. E-cigarette usage is also prohibited in all district facilities and vehicles.
  - a. For the purpose of this policy, an “E” cigarette means:
    1. An electronic cigarette.
    2. An electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS).
    3. A personal vaporizer.

### Enforcement

Employees observing a customer or another employee smoking should politely inform them that the facility is designated “smoke-free” and ask them to step outside. The supervisor in charge should be informed of situations of non-cooperation.

### Smoking Cessation

The US Surgeon General has said, “Smoking cessation [stopping smoking] represents the single most important step that smokers can take to enhance the length and quality of their lives.”

**Purpose**

The Superstition Fire & Medical District (SFMD) is providing procedure that adheres to [A.R.S. §13-3623.01](#) “Safe Haven for Newborn Infants.” The procedure will provide a detailed process for the accepting of an unwanted infant or child at any fire district facility.

**Definitions**

- A. A person is not guilty of abuse of a child pursuant to [A.R.S. §13-3623.01](#), subsection B solely for leaving an unharmed newborn infant with a safe haven provider.
- B. If a parent or agent of a parent voluntarily delivers the parent's newborn infant to a safe haven provider, the safe haven provider shall take custody of the newborn infant if both of the following are true:
  - 1. The parent did not express an intent to return for the newborn infant.
  - 2. The safe haven provider reasonably believes that the child is a newborn infant.
- C. The safe haven provider shall report the receipt of a newborn infant to child protective services of the department of economic security as soon as practicable after taking custody of the newborn infant. Child protective services shall report the number of newborn infants delivered to safe haven providers pursuant to section [A.R.S. §8-526](#).
- D. A parent or agent of a parent who leaves a newborn infant with a safe haven provider may remain anonymous, and the safe haven provider shall not require the parent or agent to answer any questions. A safe haven provider shall offer written information about information and referral organizations.
- E. A safe haven provider who receives a newborn infant pursuant to this section is not liable for any civil or other damages for any act or omission by the safe haven provider in maintaining custody of the newborn infant, if the safe haven provider acts in good faith without gross negligence.
- F. This section does not preclude the prosecution of the person for any offense based on any act not covered by this section.
- G. For the purposes of this section:
  - 1. "Newborn infant" means an infant who is seventy-two hours old or younger.
  - 2. "Safe haven provider" means any of the following:
    - (a) A firefighter who is on duty.
    - (b) An emergency medical technician who is on duty.

(c) A staff member at a health care institution that is classified by the department of health services pursuant to section [A.R.S. §36-405](#) as a hospital or an outpatient treatment center.

(d) A staff member or volunteer at any of the following that posts a public notice that it is willing to accept a newborn infant pursuant to this section:

(i) A private child welfare agency licensed pursuant to title 8, chapter 5, and article 1

(ii) An adoption agency licensed pursuant to [A.R.S. §8-126](#).

(iii) A church. For the purposes of this item, "church" means a building that is erected or converted for use as a church, where services are regularly convened, that is used primarily for religious worship and schooling and that a reasonable person would conclude is a church by reason of design, signs or architectural or other features.

### **Policy/Procedure**

1. The SFMD employees will accept possession of any infant or child.
2. SFMD personnel will inquire about any medical conditions that the infant or child may have, but any information shared by the parent/agent is voluntary.
3. The appropriate police agency shall be notified and dispatched to the district facility.
4. SFMD personnel will contact the Mesa Alarm Room 480-644-2640 for an incident number and ensure that a fire and rescue unit is assigned.
5. SFMD medical personnel will assess the baby and document as if on any other medical emergency.
6. SFMD personnel will contact the on-duty PIO and BC.
7. SFMD personnel will contact child protective services of the department of economic security.
8. If necessary, SFMD personnel will transport the infant to the nearest appropriate facility.

### **Documentation**

The Patient Care Report will include all the necessary documentation needed.

- Times (specifically the time the baby or child was relinquished).
- Assessment/condition of the infant.
- Medical history (if provided).
- Birthday (if provided).
- Disposition.

**Summary**

As it pertains to [A.R.S. §13-3623.01](#), the fire station is an approved Safe Haven drop off site. Any person working at the facility may accept the infant under the following conditions:

- The infant must less than 72 hours old
- The infant must show no signs of being physically harmed.
- The parent must indicate they do not plan to return for the infant.
- The infant must be transported immediately to the emergency department.
- SFMD personnel must ask the person relinquishing the baby if they are willing to provide pertinent information.
- Even if a child appears to be more than three days old, follow the same procedure as you would for the newborn infant.


No SFMD employee will turn any infant or child away that is given to a district employee, even if it does not adhere to [A.R.S. §13-3623.01](#).

**Mission**

Labor and Management are equally committed to enhancing the SFMD as an organization. The focus of our efforts will be a commitment to quality services for both our internal and external customers.

**Purpose**

The purpose of this document is to outline the process and guiding philosophies for a healthy and productive SFMD Labor/Management process.

**Labor/Management Guiding Philosophy's**

Fire service personnel are regarded as some of the most trusted and respected members of society and are justifiably held to a higher standard of performance and conduct. The public trusts our judgment and fully expects that we will communicate and work effectively together to avoid issues or outcomes that could threaten our ability to provide a superior service to our community. History has shown that poor Labor/Management relations are a significant distraction to the fire service mission and have the potential to erode the legacy of first-class service established by our predecessors.

The SFMD has a recent history of positive Labor/Management (LABOR/MANAGEMENT) relations and we are committed to working together to form a more positive and productive fire service organization. Fire District Management and the Executive Board of the SFMD Chapter of Local 2260 are committed to maintaining an open and cooperative relationship and enhancing the quality of services we provide both internally and externally.

**Labor/Management Team Activities**

The Labor/Management Team has a duty to participate together in the following formal activities for the purpose of planning, policy discussion, procedures development, and the resolution of problems/issues that arise within the organization.

**A. Labor/Management Team Meetings**

The SFMD Labor/Management Team meets the first Wednesday of each month, and as-needed, to discuss district policies, programs, and strategic planning as well as wages, benefits and working conditions of unionized employees.

Labor/Management meeting minutes will be approved by the fire chief and chapter VP as soon as possible after each meeting and archived on the district's web page. Meeting minutes will attempt to capture mutually agreed upon action items, terms and initiatives.

Additionally, elected labor representatives shall be provided reasonable accommodations by the on-duty BC to attend labor-related activities during duty hours. The fire district will make every reasonable effort to approve release-time for union representatives where doing so will not adversely impact emergency operations. Examples of appropriate release activities might include: Labor/Management meetings, chapter meetings, committee meetings, employee representation, fire board meetings, etc.

#### **A. Committees and Teams**

The district utilizes teams and committees to facilitate and guide the development of policies, procedures, and programs within the organization. We agree that Labor representation on all teams and committees dealing with issues that impact unionized members of the district is both vital and necessary.

#### **B. Personnel Management**

Labor and Management work together when an employee requests union representation during disciplinary actions involving members of the labor organization.

### **Principles & Values**

Labor and Management mutually agree that ethical behavior is the foundation of our relationship. We expect that our relationship will be a model for future Fire Chief's and local union officials to emulate. The following core values will serve as the basis for a successful SFMD Labor/Management relationship.

#### **We agree on the following principles:**

- I. We value a Professional, Honorable and Respectful relationship.
- II. Labor and Management must communicate regularly, deal with each other directly, and resolve issues together when they are small.
- III. The long-term Labor/Management relationship is more important to the mission than any single outcome.
- IV. It is an industry expectation that our service and communications should be driven by pragmatic solution strategies, not ideologies.
- V. Labor and Management will embrace and promote the issue of trust...trust in the "process" and trust among participants.
- VI. Honesty is the hallmark of our efforts. We agree to work together in an open manner that discloses to all parties the information and perspective we each need to know.
- VII. There must be integrity in our efforts to preclude destructive behaviors such as self-interest, self-protection, self-deception and self-righteousness from entering our work together.
- VIII. We will work to keep our commitments to each other and thus our trust in each other from being diminished. Any inability to keep our promises may become a priority issue for resolution to preserve our trusting relationship. If an agreement cannot be kept, communication between the parties is essential.

- IX. Members of Labor and Management are encouraged to communicate and collaborate regularly to further district initiatives. All parties are expected to make reasonable accommodations to meet and work together as needed.
- X. Labor and Management are expected to act with cognizance of both legal and moral liability.
- XI. There may be occasions where Labor and Management disagree with the direction and/or course of action to be taken. When management decides on a plan that conflicts with the labor's position, it shall not be represented as a labor/management decision.
- XII. It is understood that Management must make decisions to run the organization effectively, to assign members, to distribute and redistribute work, to enforce policies and rules, to respond to misconduct, dishonesty and criminal behavior, and to ensure employees meet the goals and expectations of the organization.
- XIII. We mutually agree that our interactions be characterized by respect. Respect is offered not as a payment for respect received but rather for the expectation we have of our own conduct.
- XIV. We acknowledge that we each have a responsibility to carry out our individual roles. We will seek to understand each other's roles to ensure we know what duty each is responsible to fulfill. We expect personal accountability of conduct, characterized by self-control and a constant pursuit of excellence.
- XV. Our interactions will seek justice and equity in our dealings. We support that effective measures be taken to prevent and address violations of our common philosophy. We also acknowledge that in some cases, open and visible dealings are necessary to conduct business that is perceived to be, and actually is, fair.
- XVI. We agree that all employees, regardless of rank or tenure, deserve the fundamental right to advocacy if they are being investigated and/or disciplined. Appropriate discipline must occur for just cause; it should be implemented via due process, and the discipline should be lawful, consistent, and appropriate to the incident. A progressive disciplinary process is critical to correcting negative behavior and performance, as well as returning the employee to a productive state of employment.
- XVII. Management values and appreciates the role Labor plays in assuring fair and reasonable employee actions occur in the disciplinary process.
- XVIII. Labor representation should be encouraged anytime an employee may be subject to discipline. Labor representation should not disrupt the employer-employee relationship, communications between supervisors and subordinates, or be disruptive to the disciplinary process.
- XIX. We mutually commit that our concern for each other is a primary impetus for the formation of this document. Fire Chiefs and Fire Fighters equally care about the safety and well-being of our members, as well as the welfare of the community and the excellence of departmental operations. The assumption that Labor/Management concerns are only based upon self-interest is not recognized by the philosophies and principles described herein.

- XX. We agree that we should continuously endeavor to make the fire service better for our citizens, customers, and the professionals who participate in the delivery of our services.
- XXI. We recognize that in our profession, our service must be provided unconditionally. We all have a moral obligation to our citizenry. Pursuits of organizing, establishment of, or expansion of, Labor rights and participation in the political process, must never interrupt emergency services or impede the organization's ability to respond.

**Summary**

We recognize that most employee-employer problems happen in communities where Labor and Management do not respect one another or recognize each other's importance and roles; where they are not employing any form of relational process to work collectively on challenges; and where they fail to maintain open lines of communications.

The SFMD Labor/Management Team is committed to enhancing our organization and to the provision of high-quality service to both our internal and external customers. To that end, we adopted these processes, guiding philosophies and core values to encourage and support a healthy and productive organization and Labor/Management relationship.

- Hospice services augmentation
- Online medical direction for pre-hospital providers

Dr. Smith fielded questions and comments from the Board:

### **Chairman Cross**

*“The only question I would have would be, is the biggest barrier the billable codes to be able to get reimbursed through the personnel in the field?”*

Dr. Smith stated there are different staffing models in the fire service, including not staffing transportation services with sworn personnel, which is a cost savings. He went on to explain the different types of obstacles other local municipalities ran into, including not having a separate tax identification number, and not applying to bill through Medicare and Medicaid. Fire Districts, such as the SFMD are different because they are a separate entity from the City and are able to acquire separate tax identification numbers, etc. Dr. Smith stated that this can be cost sustainable, to the point of making a profit. However, the fire service is not in the business to make a profit, just break even.

### **Clerk Gehrt**

*“As our medical director, where would you like to see us going?”*

Dr. Smith answered the question by stating a lot of it has to do with the labor force and having them accept and engaged with the different models.

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## **5. Discussion and possible approval of FirstRespondersRX 30-Day Pilot Program. (BOD #2017-09-10)**

Acting Assistant Chief Richard Ochs introduced this item to the Board stating this pilot program was similar to previous program approved by the Board in March of 2017 (BOD #2017-03-04).

David from FirstRespondersRX addressed the Board stating that the Proof of Concept provided was for a 30-day pilot program. This program much like the previous one, Firefighter Ryan Elowe will shadow his peers and utilize the Medication History application via a stand-alone application, to compare response times and data

using the system versus the time spent collecting medication history and entering the data manually. During this pilot program there is also a savings calculator to help put a finer point on the savings that can be realized by departments through the use of the application.

**Motion** by Director Strand to approve the 30-day Pilot Program with First RespondersRX that will run from September 15, 2017 through October 15, 2017 and will allow Firefighter Ryan Elowe to utilize the savings calculator to capture data points throughout our District. **Seconded** by Director House.

**Vote** 5 ayes, 0 nays. **MOTION PASSED.**

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#### **8. Update and discussion regarding the Auto-Aid Agreement and system. (BOD #2017-09-13)**

Interim Fire Chief Mike Farber gave a brief update to the Board regarding the recent changes and happenings surrounding the Auto-Aid Agreement for valley-wide departments. Chief Farber stated more information would be brought to the Board in future months. He went on to explain, Matt Busby, Assistant City Manager, will be attending a meeting in Chandler with Chief Farber later this month to discuss the Auto-Aid Agreement with other east valley agencies.

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#### **9. Discussion and update regarding the most recent JPA/Merger/Consolidation Committee meeting and possible motion regarding the Arizona Fire Medical Authority (AFMA) request. (BOD #2017-09-14) – [Addendum C](#)**

Interim Fire Chief Mike Farber stated the committee's discussions have shifted away from Arizona Fire Medical Authority (AFMA), the committee is focusing on researching other agencies. He went on to explain that AFMA sent a letter to the Board requesting a letter to move forward with the intent of our District to join AFMA. Chief Farber stated he did speak to representatives for AFMA explaining the District is exploring several options. The SFMD has provided data to AFMA – with no data in exchange from their Board in return on the benefits of joining.

Chief Farber fielded questions and comments from the Board.

Director Strand, inquired what Chief Farber's recommendation is on the subject. Chief Farber replied by stating that Staff has worked diligently and spent hours providing AFMA information. He went on to say he does not want to spend any more Staff time if we aren't receiving data in return. The District is in a good position and we should move on and look at other opportunities.

#### **Director House**

*"It seems like the original intent of this board was to look at all possibilities for the future of Superstition Fire & Medical District. All possible ways that we could help improve with purchases or mergers, just to look at the possibility. Unfortunately, the information with AFMA, the way it is leaning right now is, I personally feel that the Superstition Fire & Medical District is getting pressured into getting into some kind of agreement way before we need to do anything like that. We started off with them, it may not have been the best place to start off with. They have done one acquisition, but they are working on others. I think I would like to look at some of the fire districts that have already merged, like years, a couple of years ago. Find out how they did it and what are the repercussions from that merger, if we want to look at just that part of it. We want to explore all possibilities. Look around to see what else is happening, I feel fortunate that I agree with the Chief, we have put in a lot of Staff time a lot of effort into it. It is kind of a one way pipe at this time, we aren't getting a whole lot of information back. I think that we still would explore the possibility, I think that everybody is open to exploring all the tools in the tool box. It seems to me that they are trying to press us, to make a decision that we are not in a position that we have to do here. We are still exploring all sorts of different possibilities. Do we want to get into a general purchasing agreement, so I think that it is kind of rushed if you ask me. I feel like we should just back off a little bit and take a look at some of the other places that have done mergers and see what their response is and what happens with mergers and report back to the Board with that."*

**Director Moeller**

*“I feel the same way, I spoke to Chief and Mr. House, there is no need to rush into it and make the decision without any information, they have given us next to nothing, as far as information. So with that I don’t think we should go forward with any letter of intent. We need to hold off until we look into a lot more numbers and talk to other departments and their other department’s board of directors and pick their brains on stuff.”*

**Clerk Gehrt**

*“My two cents is that was the intent of the committee in the first place and I think you guys are right on, this was moving too fast. Maybe it is the right answer, but it is way too fast.*

**Motion** by Director House to direct staff to draft a letter addressed to the Arizona Fire Medical Authority (AFMA) stating that the Superstition Fire & Medical District would not be processing their request for extensive information at this time, also stating the JPA/Merger/Consolidation committee is researching alternate avenues regarding JPA’s mergers, and consolidations before any decisions will be made. **Seconded** by Clerk Gehrt.

**Vote** 5 ayes, 0 nays. **MOTION PASSED.**

**10. Discussion, presentation, and possible approval of the 2017/2018 Operational Plan and possible adoption of Resolution 2017-08, formally adopting the 2017/2018 Operational Plan. (BOD #2017-09-15) – [Addendum D](#)**

Acting Administrative Director Anna Butel introduced this item to the Board. She stated that the 2017/2018 Operational Plan outlines the initiatives for the next year and is a living document that can be modified throughout the year. She went on to say the service enhancements are aligned with budgeted items and planned expenditures.

Key Points discussed:

- Employee Safety, Health, and Survival

- Service Enhancements – the goal or objective

The Board thanked Staff for all of their hard work on the Operational Plan, they all agreed it is a simple document to read and the tasks are achievable and understandable.

**Motion** by Director Strand to approve the Fiscal Year 2017/2018 Operational Plan and to adopt Resolution 2017-08 fully adopting the 2017/2018 Operational Report. **Seconded** by Director Moeller.

**Vote** 5 ayes, 0 nays. **MOTION PASSED.**

**11. Discussion and update regarding the pay out of the Public Safety Personnel Retirement System (PSPRS) refund payments related to the Hall case. (BOD #2017-09-16)**

Finance Director Roger Wood introduced this item to the Board. He stated that on August 4, 2017 the District paid out the lump sum refunds to the affected sworn employees in the total amount of \$895,391.56 The District started withholding its normal per pay period contributions to PSPRS starting with the July 14<sup>th</sup> payroll

to recover the lump sum payment amount. The District's remaining balance to recover is \$430,467.97. He went on to say that at the current pace, the total amount of the initial lump sum payments should be recovered as of the November 17<sup>th</sup> payroll.

---

**12. Discussion regarding Policy 101.03 Smoking and Policy 102.46 Arizona Safe Haven for Newborn Infants brought forth to the Board to be approved at the October 18, 2017 meeting as stated at the August 16, 2017 meeting – BOD #2017-08-11. (BOD #2017-09-17)**

Clerk Gehrt reminded the Board that at the August BOD meeting, the Board requested to begin formally approving policies that have already gone through the approval process. The Board agreed to have policies added to the monthly agendas and will have a month to study/research them. These policies will then be put in the next month's agenda for approval. He stated as a for instance, Policy 101.03 and Policy 102.46 will be added to the October 18, 2017 agenda for final approval.

---

**13. Discussion and possible direction to staff regarding Policy 102.16 Earned Leaves and Policy 102.34 Separation of Service, as it pertains to reduction of workforce. (BOD #2017-09-18)**

Chairman Cross introduced this item to the Board, he explained he requested this to be added to the agenda so the Board can give direction to Staff to research the market on standard practices for both policies.

Superstition Firefighters Labor VP John Walka presented this item to the Board ([Addendum E](#)).

**Director Strand**

*“John, Captain John, thank you and Chief Farber for all you have done, it has been on the table a long time. It is nice to see it finally.”*

**Interim Fire Chief Mike Farber**

*“I would like to add that this collaborative process took a lot of work for the past six months and a lot of people had come together, and I think that any healthy organization it is essential that there is a labor management relationship and this goes a long way to building our stronger relationship and labor management. So, I have no concerns from a management perspective, it actually gives management a little, it clarifies our rights and that is always nice to see. It clarifies the rights of labor, so there is no ambiguity. I think it is a very good written document, so I have no concerns as an Interim Fire Chief.”*

**Director House**

*“If you are having an issue with reduction of work force in the MOU, we couldn’t pass this tonight because we haven’t ironed that out yet, right?”*

Mr. Walka clarified that the information regarding civilians and the reduction of workforce was pulled out of the MOU as it stands and it mirrors policy right now. He went on to say the 100% buy out was also pulled out to mirror policy.

**Director House**

*“I know we have been working on this since 2009, for some reference. I was on the Board for a couple of years, when that happened, so it has been a while and it is way past due coming. I agree with a standing MOU at the fire district, that will be an attraction for new employees to come our direction because that standing is a very important issue with labor, it is a very important issue with management. So, I haven’t got to the place that it made a big difference with employment, we aren’t at that point.”*

**Motion** by Chairman Cross to approve the Memorandum of Understanding between Superstition Fire & Medical District and Superstition Fire Medical Firefighters Chapter Local 2260, to approve Resolution 2017-09 to go into effect September 20, 2017 through June 30, 2018. **Seconded** by Director House.

**Vote** 5 ayes, 0 nays. **MOTION PASSED.**

**Vote** 4 ayes (Cross, Gehrt, House, Moeller), 1 nay (Strand). **MOTION PASSED.**

The District is a professional, paid department and does 'stack-up' with departments and districts with similar size, classifying Battalion Chiefs correctly – as exempt employees. Between the case law, the Department of Labor, and have reached out to the City of Mesa for additional clarification.

**Motion** by Clerk Gehrt to confirm that the SFMD Battalion Chiefs are and remain exempt employees under FLSA. **Seconded** by Director House.

Dear Chairman Cross,

Over the past month, the staff at Arizona Fire & Medical Authority (AFMA) has been communicating with Superstition Fire & Medical District (SFMD) Fire Chief, Mike Farber, and local labor leader, John Walka, concerning potential partnership opportunities. On behalf of AFMA Board of Directors, I would propose that we formalize the process of determining whether a partnership between SFMD and AFMA would best serve the interests of our respective organizations and the communities we serve.

It is our understanding that SFMD has established a committee to identify and assess the viability of potential partnerships. As a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) formed pursuant to Arizona Revised Statutes §48-805.01, AFMA is seeking opportunities for strategic partnerships which result in the delivery of the highest quality services for our citizenry, fiscal responsibility and a competitive wage and benefit package for our personnel.

AFMA is a regional, non-contiguous JPA which serves a number of communities in both the East and West Valley. It is our experience that the principal benefits of a regional system are reduced costs, increased effectiveness, and an enhanced depth of resources. Through the consolidation of resources, streamlining of overhead and a partnering in a regional protection system, all parties benefit. Determining whether SFMD and AFMA would see those benefits materialize is the purpose of this letter.

AFMA is proposing to proceed with a formal analysis of a partnership with SFMD which would determine whether joining AFMA would be in our combined best interest. The evaluation would be an objective, cost-benefit study to determine the feasibility of a partnering opportunity. The comprehensive examination conducted would include an assessment of the relevant financial, organizational and governance factors necessary to determine the likelihood of a "win-win" scenario for both SFMD and AFMA.

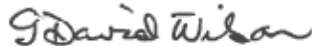
AFMA would conduct the analysis and provide SFMD with the results in a proposal format for the SFMD Board of Directors and staff's consideration. AFMA anticipates the study would require approximately 60 days to complete. Before we proceed beyond the preliminary analysis work currently underway, I'd request an affirmative expression of interest from SFMD Board of Directors.

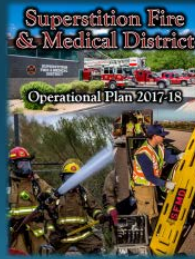

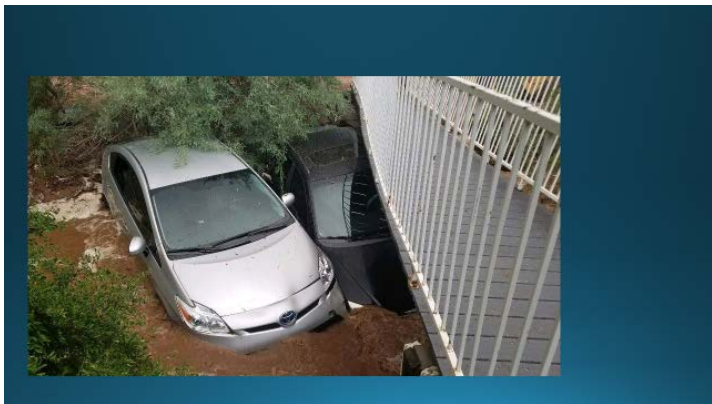

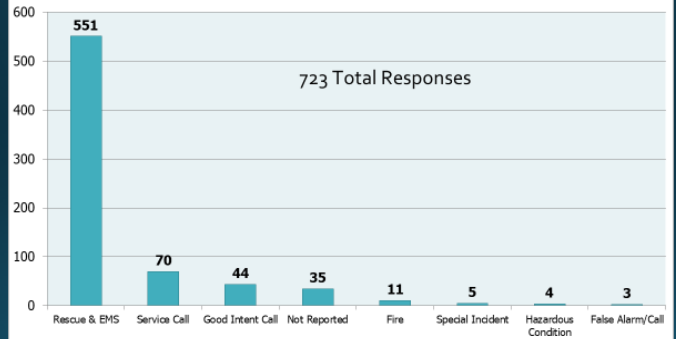

Incident Type Categories



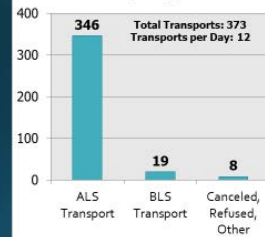

**FIRST AMENDMENT

LEASE AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN  
APACHE JUNCTION UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT #43

SUPERSTITION FIRE / MEDICAL DISTRICT**

This First Amendment to Lease Agreement by and between Apache Junction Unified School District (AJUSD) and Superstition Fire & Medical District (SFMD) (the “First Amendment”) is entered into effective as of October 1, 2017 by the Apache Junction Unified School District #43, a duly formed Arizona school district (“AJUSD”) and Superstition Fire & Medical District, a duly formed Arizona fire district (“SFMD”).

**RECITALS**

- A. AJUSD and SFMD entered into Lease Agreement as of July 1, 2016 (the “Lease”).
- B. AJUSD and SFMD each has determined it is in its best interest to enter into this First Amendment to modify the terms and conditions of the Lease only to the extent as specifically set forth in this First Amendment.

For valuable consideration given and hereby acknowledged, AJUSD and SFMD agree as follows.

- 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are incorporated into the terms of this First Amendment.
- 2. Remodeling or structural improvements. Paragraph 15 of the Lease is to add the following subparagraphs:
  - a. SFMD shall obtain AJUSD’s written consent for any construction or remodel after the effective date of the First Amendment and AJUSD shall not unreasonably withhold its consent.
- 3. Assignability. Paragraph 23 of the Lease regarding Assignability/Subletting is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
  - a. SFMD may sublet, in its sole discretion, any portion of the Leased Premises to one or more appropriate government agencies, including public safety organizations or educational institutions, for the public purpose of advancing training, education, and related administration, which are consistent with SFMD’s public safety mission.
  - b. SFMD may not sublet to any for-profit entity or any charter school.
  - c. Any notices to the occupants of the Leased Premises shall be directed to SFMD.
- 4. Terms Affirmed. Other than the provisions expressly set forth above, AJUSD and SFMD affirm that the terms of the Lease remains in full force and effect amended only as specifically set forth in this First Amendment.

5. Approval. By the signatures below, AJUSD and SFMD each represents and warrants that the party signing on its behalf is fully authorized.

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**Recreation and Public Purposes Act**

Over the past 40 years, Americans have expressed a dynamic and accelerated interest in outdoor recreation. Our expanding urban populations, increased mobility and leisure time, and higher standard of living have created a demand for more and better recreation facilities. By the same token, urban expansion and a growing population have increased the need for more public services, such as schools, community buildings, hospitals, and sanitary landfills, just to name a few.

Recognizing the strong public need for a nationwide system of parks and other recreational and public purposes areas, the Congress, in 1954, enacted the Recreation and Public Purposes Act (68 Statute 173; 43 United States Code 869 et. seq.) as a complete revision of the Recreation Act of 1926 (44 Stat. 741). This law is administered by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

The act authorizes the sale or lease of public lands for recreational or public purposes to State and local governments and to qualified nonprofit organizations. Examples of typical uses under the act are historic monument sites, campgrounds, schools, fire houses, law enforcement facilities, municipal facilities, landfills, hospitals, parks, and fairgrounds.

A 17 page "Recreation and Public Purposes Act Information Sheet" designed to guide prospective applicants in obtaining lands and benefits under the act is attached. To download the document, [select this link](#).

Department of the Interior regulations for the Recreation and Public Purposes Act are found in Title 43 of the Code of Federal Regulations (43 CFR), [Parts 2740 \(Sales\)](#) and [2912 \(Leases\)](#).

**What Lands are Covered by the Act?**

The act applies to all Public Lands, except lands within national forests, national parks and monuments, national wildlife refuges, Indian lands, and acquired lands.

Under special authority, BLM administers about 2 million acres of revested Oregon and California Railroad and Coos Bay Wagon Road grant lands in western Oregon. These lands may only be leased by public agencies under the act.

**How much Land may be Purchased?**

The amount of land an applicant can purchase is set by law. Whether the land is to be purchased or leased, the BLM will classify for purposes of the act only the amount of land required for efficient operation of the projects described in an applicant's development plan. Applicants should limit the land requested to a reasonable amount. Applicants will be required to first accept a lease, or lease with option to purchase, to assure approved development takes place before a sale is made and a patent (Government deed) is issued. Projects that may include the disposal, placement, or release of hazardous materials (i.e., sanitary landfills) may go directly to patent.

**State Agencies**

Any State, State agency or political subdivision of a state may purchase for recreation purposes up to 6,400 acres annually, and as many small roadside parks and rest sites, up to 10 acres each, as may be needed. In addition, any State, State agency or political subdivision of a state may acquire 640 acres annually for each public purpose program other than recreation. These lands must be within the political boundaries of the agency or within the area of jurisdiction of the organization or, in the case of cities, they must lie within convenient access to the municipality and within the same State.

**Nonprofit Organizations**

Nonprofit organizations may purchase up to 640 acres a year for recreation purposes, and an additional 640 acres for other public purposes.

**How Much Land may be Leased?**

The Act sets no limitation on the amount of land that may be leased.
